

Church News**Letter from the Rectory**

This month, in terms of the church, will be dominated by Holy Week and Easter. Whilst as a nation we see Christmas as being the major festival, in the life of the church Easter is more important as we celebrate Jesus rising to new life after his crucifixion, death and burial. In Holy Week, the week that leads up to Easter, we remember some of the events in the days leading up to Christ's arrest and crucifixion. Whilst some of them may not be things we particularly want to think about (betrayal, corrupt trials, death) we cannot truly understand and celebrate the wonder of Easter if we haven't thought about what came before it. Unlike those who were there at the time, we know how the story ends so we can never really enter into their despair, and we can never experience the joy of Jesus' resurrection in the same way either. Nevertheless, it is good to immerse ourselves in it as fully as we can. There are services in the churches throughout the week to help us journey through that week with Christ: details are elsewhere in the magazine and you are welcome to join us whenever and wherever you can.

Writing this in mid-March it is difficult to know how the world will look by the time you get to read it. It's currently just under three weeks since Russian tanks moved into Ukraine. Today the news reports tell me that talks between the two sides have resumed but there are also reports of hospitals being bombed: scenes that we probably never expected to see happening in 21st century Europe. Faced with such scenes it can be difficult to know what we can do. In some cases all we can do is to pray and I would encourage you to do that. Let us hope and pray that just as Easter brings joy and the promise of life eternal out of what seems to be despair, so also hope for new life may come out of the darkness of the current situation in Ukraine.

I wish you, when we get there, a very happy Easter.

*The Corvedale Kitchen***Left over lamb pilaf**

A new contributor this month. This is a great recipe for using up left over roast lamb.

Ingredients

300g of cooked lamb (left over lamb from a roast is ideal)	300ml of lamb stock
150g basmati rice	2 tablespoons of flaked almonds
200g tin of chopped tomatoes	Mango chutney or plain yoghurt to serve
100g finely chopped apricots	

Method

1. Finely chop the cooked lamb, add to a saucepan with the lamb stock and bring to a simmer.
2. Add the tinned tomatoes and the apricots and warm through for a few minutes.
3. Add the rice, cover with a lid and simmer over a low heat for 20 minutes or until all the liquid is absorbed by the rice (add a little more stock if the mix becomes too dry). Stir regularly.
4. Sprinkle the flaked almonds over the cooked pilaf and serve with either the mango chutney or the yoghurt, according to taste.

The Story of Aston Hall

Part Three: The End of the Line

Last month's article concluded with the death of Charles, Second Viscount Carington in 1706, and the life interest in all his properties, which he bequeathed to his wife Anne. The Dowager Countess lived until 1748, and it was not until then that Francis VI of Aston was able to enter into the considerable inheritance. He appears to have moved from Aston to Wootton by 1730, but only as the tenant of his cousin's widow. Unfortunately, like so many of his family, Francis was unable to produce a surviving male heir, and he lived for only a few months after inheriting all the family estates. On his death in 1749 the estates passed to an uncle, Charles Smith of Ludlow, who died four years later, again without a male heir. His brother William then inherited the estates, but died five years later without issue. As so often happened with landed families, the male line then came to an end. There were, however, two female descendants to inherit the estates.

Francis VI had two sisters. The younger, Catherine, became a nun, but the elder, Constantia was twice married. Her first husband was John Wright, of Kelvedon Hall in Essex. He died in 1751, leaving a son, also John, and two daughters. Constantia then married Peter Holford, by whom she had a daughter, Catherine Maria. When Charles Smith died in 1754, John Wright and Peter Holford held all the estates as an *undivided*

moiety - that is they were joint holders of the property rather than of a separate half each. This changed in 1776, when the estates were split, with Wright having the Aston property, and Holford's daughter's descendants having Wootton. Aston now became once again a distinct unit, with the Wrights as absentee owners.

I am not aware that the Wrights ever took much interest in their Shropshire holdings, and the Hall had already begun a new role as a farmhouse after Francis Smith VI had moved to Wootton. Other small manor houses in the district such as Elsich and Thonglands also shared this fate. I have yet to discover anything about the eighteenth century tenants, but the nineteenth century census records show that from 1841 until some time after 1871 the estate was farmed by members of the Downes family. The Downes are one of

the oldest families in the Corvedale, whose members can be found at least as far back as the sixteenth century. They were to be found along the length of the Dale (those who farmed at Aston Hall in the nineteenth century came from a branch at Shipton) and from all levels of society from minor gentry to agricultural labourers. They farmed upwards of 600 acres at Aston, which put them among the top tenant farmers of the neighbourhood. They were succeeded by the Sankey family, who had previously farmed a holding half the size of Aston at Stapleton.

Interestingly, the Wrights, like the Smiths before them, had trouble in producing heirs. John Wright (I) was succeeded by his son John, who died in 1826, who was in turn succeeded by his grandson, John Francis, as his own son had predeceased him. John Francis died without issue in 1868, and his nephew Edward Carington Wright inherited the estate. In 1896 Wright began the process of disposal of the estate by selling Upper Millichope to Capt. Beckwith of Millichope Park. In 1911 he sold the Hall and 100 acres to P.G. Holder, whom we have already met in connection with Sutton Court. Holder quickly sold the property to Mr J.I. Benson. In another transaction he sold the Middlehope portion to Holder, who in 1919 incorporated it with other lands into a completely reconstructed Delbury estate. The Bensons lived at Aston Hall until 1978, when the Hall was sold. As is often the case when a property is sold for the first time in many years, the house has changed hands several times since. Major Benson, who was well-known in the district as a land agent, and his family moved in to the Race House which he had built nearby, and where one of his grandchildren still lives.

Afterword

One of the problems of researching Aston Hall has been the absence of family papers, both for the Smith and the Wright families. They were in existence a century ago, but the Archives Services in Warwickshire and Essex have no knowledge of their whereabouts. I am grateful to Peter Bolton for ferreting out some Aston deeds in, of all places, the Shakespeare's Birthplace Trust, and for the Kidlington photograph.

I was puzzled by the adoption of the name Carington for the peerage. Eventually I discovered that, like so many who have been ennobled before and since, he must have employed a genealogist to produce a fake pedigree from Sir John Smith of Carrington in Cheshire, who lived in the thirteenth century. Interestingly, the same descent was claimed by a nineteenth century Nottingham banker, Robert Smith, who took the title of Baron Carrington in 1797. This line, which has no connection with the Smiths of Aston and Wootton, continues today. The sixth baron was Lord Carrington, who served Lady Thatcher as Foreign Secretary.



Corvedale Book Group

Exit West by Mohsin Hamid

We were delighted to welcome a new member to the book group at our March meeting. It was a sombre meeting at times in view of the news from Ukraine. Ironically, the book we had started to read just before the Russian invasion starts:

'In a city swollen by refugees but still mostly at peace, or at least not openly at war...

It might seem odd that in cities teetering at the edge of an abyss young people still go to class...

...but that is the way of things, with cities as in life, for one moment we are pottering about our errands as usual and the next we are dying, and our eternally impending ending does not put a stop to our transient beginnings and middles until the instant when it does.'

In an unnamed city in an unnamed country Saeed and Nadia meet at an evening class and begin to notice each other, surreptitiously at first, then cautiously, then more openly. Their relationship develops despite the context of restrictions to liberty, invasion, war and destruction, and death becomes commonplace. As two young people seeking some independence from their families of origin, they discover it is difficult to find somewhere to meet. They do. As the restrictions increase, they hear of doors opening into other worlds. This provides hope and a possible means of escape. Are the doors real, they ponder? What are the risks? Will paying to go through them lead to them being exploited, harmed, or killed, or will it provide an opportunity for a new and different life. What choice do they have? Could they leave family, parents, work? So, they make the choice, if it was a choice they had, and move from the familiar to the unknown.

The book charts the arrival, rather than the journey, through a door to Mykonos and thence to London, although it could as easily have been another place. Is this better than what we left; they wonder? They begin to understand the new place in which they are living, its rules and different restrictions. One of them embraces the difference, the other holds on to the familiar patterns of life, and their togetherness becomes more apart. They move onto new lives, each opening other doors.

The majority of the group found this to be one of the most powerful books we had read for some months. It was poignant, stunning, sad, harrowing. The juxtaposition with the events of the last few weeks was painful reading. The

sentences were beautifully crafted, almost poetic in cadence, echoing other forms of scripture and literature at times. One section reflects on the meaning of prayer to Saeed, how it evolved from his childhood prayers in his bedroom with his mother, bringing closeness and peace at the end of the day, to his acceptance at prayer with his father and other men, praying for the community. In exile the ritual of prayer is important in other ways, forming a connection with that past love, acknowledging present and future loss and the universality of the things they were experiencing. The writing moved effortlessly between the story of the two individuals, their relationship, and the wider picture, noting, almost casually the times when, while they were doing something, the sun was rising or setting elsewhere in the world, and elsewhere people were carrying on their normal rituals in their daily lives. The buildup of horrific events and greater restriction had even more emphasis for being described dispassionately. It seemed to mirror the way in which people might become inured to death when it becomes too commonplace to be talked about.

The artifice of the doors was both disturbing and intriguing. The author frequently describes characters on their mobile phones partaking in other worlds, into their lifestyles, for moments or for longer periods of time. In that sense moving through the door is an extension of that. Whether it was possible, or indeed really happened, is left as one of many uncertainties. We are made to think about the influence an individual has in society, whether

nationhood is important and should be preserved, what it means to choose to go into exile, to become a refugee and to recreate one's life in a different setting.

Although the book was about conflict, it was mainly about resilience and survival. The tenderness and respect that Saeed and Nadia showed to each other throughout the difficulties of building their lives anew, time after time, made emotional reading. Beyond their intimate relationship, peoples and countries pull apart, then pull together in new formations. There is no going back, but life goes on. The book gave us much to think about and would be worth re-reading.

When we meet in April, we will be discussing *Our spoons came from Woolworths* by Barbara Comyns. This story is set in 1930s London and tells the tale of 21-year-old Sophie and her painter husband Charles.

Apologies for absence were taken and minutes of the last meeting read, approved, and signed. The company was built up by Sir Lew Grade and relied on

revenue from advertisements - £140,000 in 3½ minutes, or £2 million per day! this proved to be a double-edged sword as the management was beholden to the electrician's union who could literally 'pull the plug' at short notice if their demands were ignored. Many of the programs produced for ATV were actually made at Elstree Studios in London - names that jogged the memory included Celebrity Squares, New Faces, Crossroads, Thunderbirds and TisWas; this loss of local programming, combined with a culture of 'self medication to relieve stress' lead to ATV losing its franchise to Central Television in 1982.

**A E Housman** (26 March 1859 - 30 April 1936)

Alfred Edward Housman was an English classical scholar and poet. His cycle of poems, A Shropshire Lad, wistfully evokes the constraints and limited choices of youth in the English countryside. The simplicity and distinctive imagery of the writing appealed strongly to Edwardian taste, and to many early 20th-century English composers, both before and after the First World War. Through their song-settings, the poems became closely associated with that era, and with Shropshire itself.

On Wenlock Edge, the wood's in trouble

On Wenlock Edge the wood's in trouble;
 His forest fleece the Wrekin heaves;
 The gale, it plies the saplings double,
 And thick on Severn snow the leaves.

'Twould blow like this through holt and hanger
 When Uricon the city stood:
 'Tis the old wind in the old anger,
 But then it threshed another wood.

Then, 'twas before my time, the Roman
 At yonder heaving hill would stare:
 The blood that warms an English yeoman,

Corvedale Garden Group

Bury Court Gardens, Wigmore

Saturday 19th March saw clear blue skies, no wind to speak of and temperatures which didn't have you wearing two of everything. In short, a perfect start to the years garden visits. 35 people showed up for our first visit since October 2019, so it felt like a real celebration of gardening and friendships, as we all caught up with each other whilst wondering how someone's garden could look this organised so early in the season.

Les and Margaret Barclay greeted us warmly at their garden in Wigmore and talked about their 20+ years gardening there since 1997. The courtyard below the 1820's stone farmhouse was pure stone, so there they had added topsoil and created a higher level to their garden. The driveway was edged with borders with a central oval bed and a pond just inside the gate on the left. Margaret commented that she had had to use a pickaxe to plant the occasional deeper-rooted tree. Nevertheless, it all thrived. The early spring bulbs were coming out so there was plenty of colour from daffodils, hyacinths, primulas and pulmonaria, with plenty of promise of things to come, looking at the perennials pushing through between them. Sheltering them were fruit trees and shrubs. The barn ahead of us had a whole terrace of different sized bird boxes on it. The garden was obviously very bird friendly, listening to the birdsong as we walked around.

Carrying on up the steps to the terrace in front of the house, there were gravelled beds with lavender and herbs, an owl family stone sculpture and a shallow metal dish with three metal birds, encouraging their natural counterparts to join them in pecking for seeds. We then worked our way around the sides of the house, passing a vegetable plot screened from the road by a new yew hedge to grassy lawns where chairs and tables were set for our coffee and cake later. Finally, to the rear of the house. What a surprise!

The semi walled garden was much more extensive than you would predict. In front of the main entrance was a sea of different coloured crocus, with other areas to the left of it, around the well-used greenhouse and potting table also full of naturalised bulbs - early tulips, chionodoxa, purple crocus, blue anemones, iris reticulata, yellow primulas and orange marigolds. Paths led either side of the main lawn and a deep perennial bed, down another terrace to a lower garden with two huge, neatly clipped evergreen mounds, either side of a planted older stone, cider-press. There was another, bigger pond, though I didn't spot goldfish and frogspawn as in the other pond at the front. Neat hedges framed the garden. There was a novel double rose ladder training a serious climbing rose up either side of two conifers to the side of a



stand of bamboo. Returning up the other side of the garden were flower and fruit beds still to show their full potential.

While we later sat chatting with our teas and coffees and a choice of more than half a dozen delicious cakes served by friendly volunteers, we marvelled at how Margaret kept on top of it with only 9 hours help a week. Les and Margaret are open under the NGS on Sunday 10th April 2.00-5.00pm if you would like to see the garden in a few weeks. They also open to groups by arrangement, February to May and September to October. This would be a garden worth visiting across all the seasons.




Apologies for Absence Received: Cllr I Alderson. Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: None.

Public involvement session: None.

Minutes of the Meeting of Culmington Parish Council held on Wednesday, 1st February 2022 were approved as a correct record and signed.

PC Stephen Grant (Neighbourhood Team) and Review of Policing Charter: PC Grant reported that speed checks had been carried out in the village and the average speed was 32.6 mph. He will investigate if a Speedwatch can be set up. He had received a video of lorries parked outside the Laundry Works and had forwarded this to various departments for comment. He encouraged parishioners to sign up to 'Neighbourhood Matters' to receive notification of both incidents and events and to use Operation SNAP. The police are unable to act unless they have sufficient information. Cllr Steele thanked PC Grant and PCSO Hinton. It was agreed that for the Policing Charter the top three Community Issues for the forthcoming three months should be Speeding, Anti-Social Behaviour and Other Traffic Offences.

Finance: The Financial Report was reviewed and the total as of the 14 February 2022 was £7,793.88. This was reconciled with the bank account.

Payments Authorised: D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £45, H Coonick Clerk's Salary Jan-March £678.60, travel expenses £53.20 for April 2021-March 2022, Data Protection Fee £35.

It was agreed that the Internal Auditor for 2022-2023 should be Mrs Jayne Disley. The Uncontested Election Recharge for May 2021 will be £100. It was decided to request £1000 for the Environmental Maintenance Grant.

Reports: Cllr Motley (report read by the Clerk). Shropshire Council Legal officers advise that changes to the parish boundaries need to be supported by over 50% of parishioners. She had talked to John Bellis (Shropshire Council) about the flooding at the church. Acton Scott seem to be making progress with developing new ideas. The government is encouraging closer

working with Telford and Wrekin and wants both to elect a single mayor. A petition has been set up to restore ambulance stations due to the long waits for ambulances. The proposed budget has been agreed but the Government's Levelling Up bids have been passed over.

Village Hall: Cllr Mear reported that they had held a meeting the previous week. The Pudding Night was very successful. Bookings are increasing, a Jubilee sub-committee had been set up and they plan to have events on the 3rd and 5th June. There are discussions about getting a bar in the village hall.

Flood Committee: Cllr Byng read a report from the meeting on 9th February. There is a hydraulic model for the River Teme for 2022-2023 centred on Ludlow, This would include a wider catchment area, including Culmington. John Bellis (Shropshire Council) reported that there is a Culmington funding pot; some of this is for tree planting as a means of reducing flow.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: It was agreed that the Clerk should report the considered boundary changes to Shropshire Council and discuss how to involve parishioners in the review at the next meeting.

Planning Update: It was agreed that the Clerk should refer this matter to Cllr Motley.

Condemned Tree in Culmington Village: It was agreed that the Clerk should contact Shropshire Council.

Road Closure and Informing Residents: Deferred to the next meeting.

Queen's Jubilee Canopy and Plaque: An elm tree is due to be planted in the churchyard. The clerk will request a plaque.

Further Nominations for the Lord Lieutenant's Garden Party: No further nominations.

Water Leak at Castle Barn Bank: The work carried out by Shropshire Council Highways appears to have been successful.

Plastic Waste at Laundry Works: Despite telephone calls and emails the Clerk has not had an update from the Environment Agency.

Parish Council Website and Planning: Cllr Motley has asked the Planning Department to work with Web Orchard, who host the Parish website, to ensure the link is restored.

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Edward Povey, Nigel Dobson, David Marston, Val Fotheringham and Graham Williams. Also Present: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllr Meeson - received and accepted.

Declaration of Interest: Cllr Williams for item Land South of Bowgate Farm Rowe Lane.

Public Forum: Mr and Mrs Cleevly were in attendance re Aston Hall. They reported that Shropshire Council planning department required a new application. The changes included an environmental assessment, and proposals for the yew hedge now satisfied Shropshire Council. Two reports on noise pollution state that the noise from the swimming pool would not be perceptible. They are employing a surveyor jointly with their neighbour to register the boundary of the property.

Minutes from meeting held on 3rd February 2022 were approved.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council has been given a single-year settlement by the Government. Mr Gove is keen for Shropshire, including Telford and Wrekin, to have a Mayor and the Council is discussing this. The Council is working with the hospital trust to assist with bed blocking. They are still waiting for the outcome of the bus service bid which would make a difference to public transport in the Corvedale. The budget for road repairs has increased.

Urgent Items: Cllr Marston reported a manhole cover at Hungerford has slipped and has left a hole.

Planning Matters: 22/00278/FUL - Erection of a building for the storage of farm machinery/tools and stabling of horses; widening of existing field access from 4.5m to 9m Land South of Bowgate Farm, Rowe Lane: Cllr Williams left the room for this item. Four supported and one abstained. Resolved to support the application.

22/00278/FUL - Erection of garage to rear of existing stable block, erection of front boundary wall and partial demolition of existing wall at the Chains, Munslow: Resolved to support the erection of a garage but with a clause preventing residential or commercial uses. The erection of a boundary wall was objected to as the Council does not believe that the land is owned by the applicant.

21/05921/LBC: Aston Hall. Reconsultation due to amendments on the application. The Council resolved to support this re-application as they are satisfied with the amendments.

Reports: The Council needs to consider the Parish boundaries and whether there would be a benefit from joining a larger parish. Acton Scott plans are making progress.

Beambridge Village Hall: Cllr Dobson reported that the committee had accepted the quote for heating and lighting works. Wifi is now in place.

Finance: The reconciled bank account holds £13,027.45 as of 22nd Dec 2021. There have been no payments since that date. Cllr Marston signed the bank reconciliation.

Internal Auditor: It was agreed that the internal auditor for 2022-2023 would be Mr Kevin Adams.

Payments Authorised: H Coonick (salary Jan -March) £488.20 and travel expenses (Dec-Feb) £13.05. Cllr Archer (postage and heating costs) £8.00.

Highways: The VAS sign will be replaced as it is still faulty. The highest speed recorded was 74.5mph with an average of 1,000 vehicles passing per day. West Mercia police have got funding for speed checks along the Corvedale.

The verge near The Swan needs repairs by Shropshire Council and a report has been made.

Joint Parishes Highways Proposals: The report should be completed by the end of March. The Council had received an email from a parishioner who was concerned about the speed of traffic through Munslow and the lack of vehicle activated signs. Cllr Motley was asked to support the proposals of Joint Parishes working group. She reported that a lot of highways work was now being taken back 'in house' and asked for the report to be sent to her.

Parking at the War Memorial, Munslow: A report will be made to Shropshire Council regarding the parking and it will be included in the Policing Charter.

Application for Environmental Maintenance Grant: £500 was allocated in the budget for the next financial year and an application for matched funding from Shropshire Council will be made.

Hedge cutting along the B4368 is being undertaken by Shropshire Council contractors.

Correspondence: Nominations for Lord Lieutenant's Garden Party - three parishioners will be nominated by the Parish Council for their voluntary work during the pandemic.

Policing Charter and Meeting with Superintendent Bill: The Clerk reported on a meeting between Clerks and West Mercia Police. It was agreed to keep Speeding and Theft from Outbuildings on the Charter and add parking on pavements. Also to comment on communications between the Police and Shropshire Highways regarding speeding enforcement.

Arrangements for the Jubilee weekend 3rd to 6th June 2022: Cllr Archer will attend a meeting on the 8th March 2022 to discuss events. Millichope Park have agreed for an event to be held in their grounds.

The Queen's Jubilee Canopy: An oak tree with a plaque will be planted and a photograph provided to the Queen's Green Canopy, who are mapping the sites.

The Position of Waste Bin: It was decided that up to £300 will be spent on a waste bin next to the bus shelter in the Community Car Park near The Swan. It will be emptied by the landlord of The Swan.

Action regarding a Defibrillator: This was deferred to the next meeting.

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*Parish Councils Continued...***DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL****Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 23rd February 2022 at Diddlebury Village Hall**

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs T O'Boyle, A Watson, A Rattu, G Neden, T Pardoe, R Morgan and S Povall. Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr R. Povall.

In Attendance: The Clerk, Unitary Cllr Motley and five members of the public plus one by Zoom.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Public Involvement: Sara Thompson has distributed 30mph wheelie bin stickers around Diddlebury village; spares are being sent to other parts of the parish. The Chairman thanked Sara for her work.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 26th January 2022 were approved by councillors and signed by the Chairman. There were no matters arising.

Reports: *The Chairman* thanked Sara Thompson for her efforts in obtaining the offer of a free defibrillator for Diddlebury. It is subject to a time limit so it is hoped the DVH Committee will agree to site it and arrange a supply of electricity within the time limit. There is still no action on the CIL front, which has now passed to a Mr West at SC. The issue of renovating the stables at Delbury Hall Lodge is being investigated by SC. Much time was spent on establishing whether the Moors View planning application falls within Diddlebury or Bache Mill; it is now agreed to be in Diddlebury. Likewise, the location of the Dutch Barn application had to be investigated as the planners now deem it to be in Corfton. With some councillors he had attended a site visit at Hale Barn. He fed back to councillors details of planning enforcement issues gleaned from a Zoom meeting he had attended for parish council Chairmen.

Unitary Cllr Motley reported on SC's current budget objectives and on the government's levelling-up scheme. It appears SC would have to amalgamate with another LA, probably Telford & Wrekin, with a mayor in overall charge, if any assistance were to be gained from Mr Gove's proposals. Neither SC nor T&W have any appetite for this. SC's transport plan has been submitted to the government and a decision is awaited. She again urged the parish council to conduct and conclude its Community Governance Review so it can be discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting.

Cllr Neden gave the FAG report. The level gauge on Pye Brook is now operational and alarms are being arranged on the upper and lower levels; it remains to be decided to whom alarm messages should be sent and how. Recent minor flooding in Mill Lane was caused by blocked gullies - no properties were flooded.

Cllr Rattu reported on Diddlebury Village Hall. A TV licence has been obtained so sporting events can now be shown and a debit/credit card machine is now available to accept payments.

Cllr Watson thanked DPC for the £2,000 grant for the purchase of Westhope Village Hall. The Committee are actively working with other hall committees to organise joint Platinum Jubilee events for June.

Planning applications: 22/00279/FUL - An application for the proposed conversion of the Dutch barn at the Hale Barn site into three dwellings for rent. The applicant joined the meeting via Zoom and answered various questions raised by councillors and the public. The Chairman outlined the planning history relating to this Dutch barn and explained the reasons why the Planners now say it is located in Corfton, whereas in all previous applications it has been in Diddlebury. After considerable discussion, DPC voted by a majority to support the planning application.

22/00279/FUL - An outline application (all matters reserved) for the erection of two detached dwellings and one pair of semi-detached dwellings on land at the Moors View, Diddlebury.

The Chairman advised this site was always assumed to be in Diddlebury, which is designated as open countryside where open market housing development is not permitted. A query had arisen suggesting it may be in Bache Mill, which permits limited development. This was fully investigated and SC now agrees that the site is in Diddlebury. The Chairman therefore proposed that DPC could not support this application as it falls within open countryside and councillors unanimously supported the proposal.

Highways: DPC has been asking SC Highways for three years for the 30mph limit in Mill Lane to be extended beyond Honeydene Farm as there is no pavement, poor visibility and pedestrians are endangered by speeding traffic. No response has ever been forthcoming from SC. It was agreed to put pressure on SC, to discuss it with the police road safety teams and to investigate putting up pedestrian warning signs.

Communications & Correspondence: 16 items of correspondence were considered. It was agreed DPC should support an initiative to prohibit vehicles from using green lanes.

Grievance Procedure for employees: A further draft Grievance Procedure was considered, which will be refined and further considered at the March meeting.

AOB: No matters were raised.

Next meeting: Wednesday 23rd March 2022 commencing at 7.30pm in Westhope Village Hall

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


