

# **CHURCH NEWS**

## LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

As someone who spent the first part of his career in teaching, I still find that I think of the year as being split into three terms, even though much of what I do carries on whether it is term-time or not. The school holidays are arranged around Christmas, Easter and the summer, defining the summer as late July and all of August. We sometimes forget that the school summer break was originally timed to allow children to help with the harvest, and I have seen Victorian school log books showing that the summer break only started when crops locally were ready to be brought in. In those circumstances, of course, at least some of the children would have swapped one type of work for another, and whilst we may be told that 'a change is as good as a rest', it probably didn't feel that way at the time.

Inevitably, the summer cannot be a time of rest and relaxation for us all: if your work is tourism-related the summer is probably your busiest time. If you work in farming you have crops to harvest (weather permitting) or livestock to look after, or both. If you're the rector you find that many couples like the idea of a summer wedding in a pretty part of the countryside...

We live in a time in which we are constantly bombarded with the news (much of it gloomy), with emails and with more information than we know what to do with – all of this, quite often, on top of whatever demands are made on us by our work. This, I think, makes it more important than ever for us to take some time out – time to focus on those people or things that are important to us, time to relax, time to enjoy just 'being', whether that's at home or somewhere special to us. The Bible reminds us that having spent six days creating, God rested on the seventh day, and the importance of sabbath rest is highlighted at various points as we read the scriptures. Whenever and however it comes, it is important that we all look for opportunities to take some time to rest, to relax and to remember what it is that makes us the people we are. I hope that, at some point, such an opportunity comes for you.

# **CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP**



A hardy group of fourteen of us turned out on Saturday 12th July, equipped with sun hats and sunscreen to bravely explore lvy Croft, near lvington, Leominster in the heat. The first challenge was finding our way there along the Herefordshire lanes because of diversions. It is a four-acre garden, surrounding an earlier cider house, which we first visited in the early days of the Garden Group as it is famous for its extensive, exquisite snowdrop collection. Roger Norman greeted us warmly and explained how he and his late wife had developed the garden over a number of years and had added to the



acreage since 1997. There is a small formal garden around the house and conservatory with pleached pear trees, neatly trimmed yew and a gravel garden humming with bees on the marjoram and thyme and bright with day lilies. From there the garden extends to the two greenhouses, sheltering a wide range of succulents, pelargoniums and geraniums in addition to some tender ferns. The plant nursery and

potting gardens are bordered by pleached apples. Moving further into the main gardens are bright herbaceous borders with established shrubs and trees adding structure and form. There are several willow sculptures. A woodland area is bisected by a stream and contains a pond with ferns and trilliums making the most of the shade. Numerous seating areas were scattered around the garden offering shady spots to sit and gaze peacefully. The peeling bark of silver birch and copper brown paperbark maple added texture, as did a number of mature evergreen trees. We spotted a mulberry tree and an unusual crab apple. The clematis grow prolifically here in hues of blue, purple and pink, spreading up the walls, along hedgerows and plant supports. At the rear of the garden is a rewilded area of longer grass and nettles providing a habitat for birds, insects and smaller mammals. Having explored in a leisurely manner we collected drinks and cake from the barn and sat to chat together. For more information about openings under the National Garden Scheme in August and September check out www.ivycroftgarden.co.uk

Our August meeting, on **Saturday 9th August** is at Brooches House, Craven Arms at 10am, entry £2.50. We are looking forward to meeting Julia and Anthony Wood who will share their garden with us. It has been a 40-year labour of love. There are herbaceous borders, rose beds, lawns and terraces with beautiful views towards the Stretton Hills. Five recently acquired acres have added kitchen and soft fruit sections, a wildlife pool, and large areas of wildflower meadows with grassland walks. # SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL UPDATE

It has been a pleasure to attend many of the local parish council meetings over the past month and needless to say there are a great many concerns about potholes and highways problems. I am pleased to see many new pothole repairs completed yet there are many more to do. We now expect work to commence shortly to repair the road at Bouldon where the stream has eroded the roadside.

Part of my council induction training included a very useful session by the highways department when it was explained exactly why the repairs we see often appear piecemeal and not coordinated. By law, the council is required to fill dangerous potholes as a matter of priority whereas the longer-term plans to resurface roads are not seen as urgent but are of course just as important and will be longer lasting. Clearly the department's budget is tight and with over 3,000 miles of roads and lanes to look after this will be an ongoing dilemma between the roads we all need and the money that can be found to pay for them.

I am pleased to say that I have been asked to join the Shropshire Hills National Landscape (AONB) Partnership as a representative of our area, and I look forward to our first meeting in Craven Arms in a couple of weeks' time. There is an on-going public consultation on a new five-year plan,


# CORVEDALE FOOTPATH & MAINTENANCE GROUP

# GREEN IDEAS TO ENTERTAIN CHILDREN ON SCHOOL HOLIDAYS!

The long-awaited summer holidays are here. Children are eager for the time at home to play and relax. But it can be anything but relaxing for parents and grandparents. After the first couple of weeks, entertaining children can be both exhausting and expensive.

So here are a few ideas to pass sunny days away and help children to connect with nature...

We know it's important for children to play outside, it develops them physically and by running, climbing and exploring it helps them stay active. It improves balance and coordination and the time in sunlight helps the body produce that important vitamin D.

Green spaces have a calming effect on children, especially woodlands: they improve their mood and lowers stress. Research has shown that time in nature improves concentration and stimulates their imagination.

We find that spending more time amongst animals, plants and eco systems helps children to connect with other living things and will hopefully inspire them to care for their natural environment when they get older.

Painting outside is fun: when my grandchildren were little they loved painting each other's bodies! Cheap rolls of lining wallpaper can be rolled out in the garden and footprints, leaf prints, rolling painted pebbles, stamping with sticks etc. produces lovey textures. Outside painting can be big. Use chalks on paving slabs and fence panels, the marks can easily be hosed off.

Make a kite: there are lots of design ideas on the internet. Flags are fun to make too, a centre piece in the garden or small ones on lollipop sticks for a trail. Rip up some old cotton sheets or pillowcases to make them.

Collect small twigs that resemble a person, then wind wool around them to make different characters... you could have a go at stickman or even a scarecrow. Carving sticks is fab. Experiment with different branches to find a species that carves well, some are much easier to carve than others. Again you can wind wool, fabric and beads to decorate your handmade walking stick. You could make a holly wooden spoon for cooking.

Bee hotels create great habitats: look at the one in Sainsbury's car park in Ludlow and see just how many bees have used it for a base. There are lots of designs again on the internet, but a tin can works very well as the base.

Children love water, but so do garden creatures in this hot weather. Ponds don't have to be expensive with liners etc. Any household item that will hold water will make a small pond. Be creative in making it a habitat, with rocks, stones, sticks and plants, but if it has steep sides, do provide a ramp as an escape route. Put it in a shady place and top it up regularly. If you do make one, creatures will find it surprisingly quickly.

Growing plants from seeds is interesting, try runner bean seeds in a jar, cress on a damp cloth... or even in an eggshell decorated with a face. Cut the tops off root vegetables and watch them re sprout in a dish of water. These quick result growing projects can then be transferred to veg growing in the garden.

Enter vegetables or flowers the children's section of Clee St Margaret's Summer Fair on **16th August** at 2pm or Culmington Produce Show the following day, also at 2pm or the Corvedale Show on **6th September.** 

Collecting and pressing wildflowers was popular in the 1960's, and it's still ok to do if you make sure it's not a rare species! Having a competition to see who can collect the most different species of grass is challenging when you are out for a walk too.

Rummage in the recycling bin and make a sculpture out of disposable cartons and boxes. Empty milk cartons can be shaped into great bird feeders and water sources, which can be hung from a tree.

Decorating trees by winding fabric around tree trunks and branches is an ancient art form in eastern countries, but wool plaited or crocheted in lengths looks interesting dangling from branches in the breeze.

If you are lucky enough to have a butterfly net, purchase a butterfly chart from FSC, they are suitable for children to use outside when identifying species. The bee chart is really good, and you will be amazed at the variety bees in the UK. Take part in The Big Butterfly Count organised by the Butterfly Conservation Charity to help scientists monitor their population, taking place now.



Making charts of what you see, or writing a journal is an important record of what's around your local area. You can even upload your species list to irecord, an UK recording website.

Mammal tunnels are fascinating. Take a length of square drainpipe and put a piece of paper inside. Make an inky pad of charcoal and vegetable oil to put at the entrance and see what creature has tiptoed through overnight: the little feet leave great tracks to identify. Check if your local wildlife group has a moth trap you could borrow. A parent might even be able to make a simple one. Moths are a fascinating species; there is such a variety of them flying at night. Make use of binoculars, a magnifying glass and a camera to record what you see.

Scrappies store, in Church Stretton, is a wonderful place to grab bargain craft equipment. It has a section where you can fill a basket for about £5. You will find items like card, jars, remnants of wool and fabric, pens and surplus items from retailers. Well worth a visit.

# MUSINGS ON LIFE...

# THE PROF AND THE LAND-WHISPERER

Please let me tell you about two things that have happened to me recently: one made me cough and splutter a bit, and one made me smile from ear to ear!

I used to work in a hospital in Banbury, north of Oxford, and sometimes we were blessed with a Friday lunchtime talk from an Oxford luminary. It was a few years before the millennium that we heard from a professor of genetics from that ancient seat of learning. What a story he entranced us with! The vast billions that were being spent on laying bare the human genome were going to take us to a new place where all the secrets of our life – individual and communal – would be explicable, including (of course) our diseases. The trouble is that this description of the future was almost completely wrong, and I now know that some wise people were saying so all along.

I wonder what 'The Prof' did post-2000 when he learnt that the human at the 'lofty apex of creation' had a genome that was comfortably less interesting than the food he was eating at The Oxford Balti House! I suspect he did not throw his hands in the air and go and stack shelves in Tesco.

So, although hundreds of genomics labs went bust, I understand there has been a quarter-century rear-guard action and, of course, in unusual instances, genetics are really important. This promotion of genomics has been so successful, (inevitably so we may think in view of the big interest battalions at its beck and call) that a few weeks ago our government announced its intention to study the genome of every baby born in this land.

Who will weep with me for the generations yet unborn?

A few days later I read the story of a 22-year-old girl who had been given the 'gift' of a free read of her genome by the lab she worked for. She had something like an 11% chance of developing a cardiomyopathy (a heart condition that I would not recommend), by the time she reached middle age. Put yourselves in her shoes for a second.

Where will the government get its army of sages to impart such information to parents who have just received the miraculous gift of child, or will a text message be the pragmatic industrial answer?

Earlier this month Sue and I went to an 'event' - Groundswell - which started life as part of the regenerative agricultural movement but also attracts people from many walks of life who are longing for the right changes in our world. There we encountered 'The Land Whisperer.' It was land in the wider context; life in the soil and the animals and plants that lived on the surface of the land. He started with some interesting science about the electromagnetic waves produced by our own brains. We have been able to detect these pulsating energy fields for some time. As the name suggests they are alternating energy, electricity and magnetism, and there are characteristic modes of this energy in high activity, and, in relaxed, meditative or calm states, a 'Dynamic Grace State.' These low frequency waves are the ones to encourage. We are now told that we are not alone in emitting and being sensitive to such energy. So, we can enter a room and sense the mood in a split second, and a small animal can have an immediate calming effect on a child. We are, however, perhaps only at the start of relearning a larger kinship with animals and plants, who also produce their signature energetics.

The upshot of all this is that the landscape and everything within it has not only the ability to be in equilibrium with itself but also to offer to communicate with us. The ultimate challenge might be to strike up a deal with the wasp that wants a chunk of your jam sandwich!

This is what I suspect – that we have always had these abilities but, for most of us, they have been pushed well below our consciousness in our 'developed' western world. Or perhaps not totally: how many of your family and friends talk to their animals or even their plants? They do so as they know it's an effective bidirectional communication. Few of us (yet) have ancestral facility to whisper to the land or negotiate with animals and plants, but somehow it just seems a little less dotty.

The key, we are told, is love and gratitude and longing.

If you sense some whispering coming I would recommend 'Subtle Energies of Nature' with Patrick MacManaway on YouTube as an introduction.

# **CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP**





We started July's meeting with a discussion about *The Salt Path* which had been in the media all week. We had read *The Salt Path* by Raynor Winn recently and some of us had seen the film, starring Gillian Anderson and Jason Isaacs. It had been disappointing to learn that we might have been 'scammed' by our wish to hear a tale which had a happy ending. If Raynor Winn has been lying about it, it can't be a comfortable place to be. I personally feel sad that she may have inadvertently put undue pressure on people with Corticobasal Degeneration, a truly horrible neurological condition, by implying if they did lengthy and difficult walks they would extend their lives and improve their health. Time will tell...

We then moved on to discuss this month's read, The Girl with the Louding Voice. I had read and enjoyed it a couple of years ago and now enjoyed the re-read. Despite some difficult content it is an optimistic story about Adunni's resilience. Written in the first person, Adunni speaks colloquially but powerfully to make her presence felt. It is a story of adversity but clearly billed as fiction. Adunni is a 14-year-old Nigerian girl, whose caring mother had fairly recently died of, possibly, tuberculosis. She has an older brother, a mechanic, and a younger brother, Kayus, whom she tries to look after and protect. Her mother gave her a lot of love and a strong value base, reminding her that a good education was critical. She had tried to make her husband promise on her death bed that Adunni could continue her schooling. Grieving too, and not coping financially, Papa had other ideas. He 'sells' his daughter to a man in an adjacent village as a third wife, for four goats, two bags of rice, some chickens, money for rent and a new television. Adunni, unlike her friends Ruka and Enitan, does not see marriage and the wedding preparations as an occasion to be joyous, but rather as her opportunities in life shutting down.

She moves villages, leaving her home, friends, family and schooling only to be berated and physically bullied by first wife, Labake, and befriended by pregnant second wife, Khadija. Adunni's husband, Morufo, makes it clear on her first night that she is a commodity who had one purpose, to get

pregnant and produce a son and heir as soon as possible. He describes the rota he has set up to gratify: his medication, alcohol, and alcohol fueled sexual desires. Khadija, too, had been married off by her father when he became sick with diabetes and could no longer work. Pregnant with her fourth child, with three previous daughters, Khadija believes Morufo cannot conceive sons and resumes an affair with her boyfriend Bamidele to get pregnant by 'a real man.' His family have sons but are cursed that they will lose children in childbirth unless they bathe in the river with special soap. Khadija helps Adunni to use a form of contraception, so she does not become pregnant, but as her pregnancy nears its term she becomes unwell and asks Adunni to accompany her to find Bamidele and the special soap. Sadly, her labour starts early, and she dies. Adunni panics, fearing she will be blamed, and runs away when she discovers Bamidele has a pregnant wife and isn't returning as promised. Adunni goes to her mother's friend who asks her son to help. Mr Cola 'sells' Adunni into domestic slavery in Lagos, where she tries to discover what happened to Rebecca, the housemaid who was there before her. She is befriended by the cook, beaten by Big Madam her employer and at risk from her employer's husband, Big Daddy, who is unemployed, entitled and a sexual predator. Adunni has to work around the clock to survive. She is befriended by Ms Tia, a doctor's wife whom she helps in return. Ms Tia helps Adunni to improve her English and to apply for the Ocean Life scholarship for her education. Adunni uses Big Madam's library to improve her knowledge, reading the Nigerian Book of Facts and the Collins English Dictionary to broaden her linguistic skills.

The book raised many questions for us and provoked a lively discussion – about gender roles, sexuality, lack of educational opportunities for girls, bullying and exploitation, but also about friendship, resilience and self-belief. It is well worth a read.

When we meet in August we will be discussing **Sandi Toksvig's Between the Stops**. Please let me know if you would like to join us.

# **MANEESH**

from the kitchen of Martin Jones

These soft, slightly sweet flatbreads are found all over North Africa and the eastern Mediterranean. This makes three loaves but it's easy to scale down. It goes very well with salads.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

500g plain white flour (not strong flour) + extra for dusting 10g salt

25g sugar

10g dried yeast

4 tbsp olive oil

360ml warm water

6 tbsp sesame seeds

1 tbsp honey

# **METHOD**

- 1. Dissolve the sugar in the warm water and stir in the yeast. Cover and leave for 10-15 minutes until it has frothed up.
- 2. Mix the flour and salt together. Add the yeast mixture and the olive oil. Mix together well to form a really soft, sticky dough.
- 3. Put some flour on a worktop and flour one hand. Scoop out the dough and throw it at the worktop (literally!). Then scoop it up and repeat. Continue for 10 minutes by which time nearly all of the stickiness will have gone and you will have a very soft, smooth dough. Put in a warm glass bowl and leave in a warm place for about an hour or until the dough has doubled in size (if your oven has a 40°C setting you can put this on for the first half hour of rising).
- 4. Take three baking trays and oil them. Divide the dough into three. Place each piece on a tray and pat it down into a circle about 5-6mm thick. Add a little hot water to the honey and, using a pastry brush, paint the loaves with the honey mixture. Scatter the sesame seeds over the tops. Leave the loaves to rise for about 20 minutes in a warm, draught-free place.
- 5. Preheat the oven to 210°C fan. Put the trays in and bake for around 15 minutes till the loaves are brown and crusty on the outsides but not burnt.
- 6. When baked, remove from the trays and cool on a wire rack. Eat as soon as the bread is cool.



# **DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL**

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 25TH JUNE 2025 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

**Present:** Cllr D Hedgley (Chairman), Cllrs T O'Boyle, R Povall, S Povall, A Rattu and R Morgan.

Apologies: Cllrs A Watson and C Martyn.

**In attendance:** The Clerk, Cllr Colin Stanford, Corvedale Division Shropshire Councillor, and six members of the public.

**Declarations of Interest:** Cllr A Rattu declared an interest in the planning applications 25/01457/FUL and 25/01458/LBC and left the room whilst the applications were discussed and voted on.

**Co-Option of a Ninth Councillor:** Dr William Watts of Sutton Hill Cottage, Stanton Lacy was duly co-opted and welcomed as the ninth member of Diddlebury Parish Council.

**Public Involvement Session:** Mrs K Worthington raised queries about the new houses at 3-4 Mill Lane, and she advised of the blocked footpath from the bridge on B4368 to Bache Mill.

**Approval of Minutes:** Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 14th May 2025 were approved and four matters arising were dealt with.

**Reports:** The Chairman reported that Hereford Diocese was intransigent in its refusal to allow the erection of the WWI information board by the War Memorial in the churchyard so he was seeking to site it on the pavement by the church gate instead. This month he had dealt with an SC questionnaire, highways matters in Bouldon and blocked footpaths in Middlehope.

Corvedale Cllr Colin Stanford said he was keen for there to be better communications between SC and parish councils. At a recent SC Cabinet meeting it had been agreed not to proceed with the North West Relief Road around Shrewsbury: £39 million has been spent on consultant's fees, but no land had been purchased nor had any work commenced. DPC asked that their dismay at this wasted £39 million be conveyed to the Cabinet. Potholes were raised as they fill Cllr. Stanford's inbox. He had ascertained that only potholes of a certain depth had to be repaired by SC by law. He had attended his first Planning Committee meeting and was disappointed that an application supported by the relevant parish council had been refused permission by the Committee. No Conservative or Reform councillors had been offered any significant roles at SC. He had been appointed to the Health Overview Scrutiny Committee but the role conferred no power. He

had been in touch with the Chairman and Highways over the proposed road closure in Bouldon.

**Planning Matters:** 25/01457/FUL and 25/01458/LBC – applications for the erection of a single storey extension, part demolition of a garage and replacement with a studio and erection of 18 solar panels on the roof of an existing building, plus listed building consent for the proposed works at Bache Mill House, Bache Mill. Councillors supported these applications.

25/01873/FUL – application for the demolition of a pair of semi-detached dwellings and replacement with four dwellings at 3-4, Mill Lane, Diddlebury. Representatives from Connexus Housing attended and said three houses would be available for rent (applicants must have applied to Home Point and be local) and one would be an affordable shared ownership property. It was hoped they would be available for occupation by the end of 2026.

Councillors considered the plans and documents and raised various issues with the Connexus representatives and, when satisfied, supported this planning application.

**Communications and Correspondence:** 12 items were considered and noted

**Highways and Environmental Matters:** DPC had received notification that the public highway in Bouldon would be closed during weekdays from 26th August to 19th September so that repairs could be carried out to the retaining wall alongside the stream. The Chairman and Cllr Stanford would hold a meeting with Highways to see if better arrangements could be made about the road closure timings.

**Finance Report for June 2025:** Cheques totalling £507.57 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds of £21,052.51 including ring fenced and third-party funds. Payment of the 2025 – 2026 Precept and the VAT reclaim had now been received. The Cash Book/Bank Statement reconciliation was approved by ClIr O'Boyle.

Any Other Business: No matters were raised.

There being no further business to conduct, the meeting was closed at 8.50pm.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Wednesday 23rd July 2025, commencing at 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.

# DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING OF MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON 2ND JULY 2025

**Present:** Cllrs Richard Arnold, Stuart Rowbotham, Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, David Marston and Graham Williams. Cllr Barbara Archer joined the meeting after the National Landscape consultation, having attended the South Shropshire Area Committee meeting beforehand.

**In Attendance:** Cllr Colin Stanford (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Cllr Richard Arnold was elected as the temporary chair.

**Apologies for Absence**: Cllrs Ed Povey, Chris Meeson and Barbara Archer until later in the meeting.

Declarations of Interest: None.

**Public Forum (limited to 15 minutes):** A member of the public asked about the Nature Recovery Strategy. The Council explained that Mr Mike Kelly had given a presentation at the previous meeting about the Parish Council's duty regarding the Natural Environment and its unique position in supporting the nature recovery process. A plan would set out showing how the parish wanted to protect, manage and improve nature within the parish.

**Minutes** of the meeting held on 4th June 2025 – with minor amendments – were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

**Reports:** Shropshire Council – Cllr Stanford encouraged the Council to respond the Call for Information Survey mentioned below. He wished to share information on highways after attending an information session. Roads generally had a lifespan of 25 years but if repairs could be carried out promptly within the first 10 years their lifespan could be extended. The Council had a legal requirement to fill potholes deemed to be dangerous, and as the team was short of money other potholes nearby might not be filled at the same time. The team was trying to improve Fix My Street, the system used by public to report potholes and other issues. Work on the Northwest Relief Road would be paused as costs had escalated. The

Council was also introducing a charge for Telecare (a range of assistive technologies designed to support individuals to live independently). He spoke at a planning committee meeting on behalf of another parish so was very willing to represent the views of the Parish Council. He would sit on the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Shropshire Hills National Landscape Group. Plans for the kerbside collection of food waste had been delayed.

**Munslow Village Hall** – Cllr Dobson reported that the walk and cream tea at The Crown had been very successful and raised £410 for the village hall. A working party was being organised to redecorate the hall. An increase in the cost of wifi by Voneous meant that the wifi in the hall would be cancelled. Cllr Fotheringham raised the issue of clashes of events with other parishes and whether there was a way to prevent this.

**Burial Ground:** Mrs Anne Donnelly was thanked for having supported the Caring for Gods Acre Team on their visits to the Munslow Burial Ground. A new contact was being sought to greet the team and ensure the working party visit went ahead without any problems. A request for volunteers would be published on the website, Corvedale News, Facebook and WhatsApp Group.

**Tree Works in the Munslow Burial Ground:** After reviewing three quotes, Oli Francis would carry out the required work after the end of August. He would complete a planning application on behalf of the Parish Council. It was agreed to make a payment of £1,300 for the tree work and £50 for the planning application.

**Parish Nature Recovery Plan:** A request would be made via the website, Facebook page, Corvedale News and WhatsApp Group for people to form a working group interested in working on a plan.

**Shropshire Hills National Landscape Consultation:** The Council would not make a comment.

Call for Information Survey from Cllr David Minnery, Shropshire Council Chair, Transformation and Improvement Overview Committee: Councillors discussed the survey and the clerk would complete it based on their responses.

**New Tasks for the Environmental Maintenance Contractor:** To cut back the verges on Park Lane later in the summer and the brambles around the seat and notice board in the car park in Aston Munslow.

**Risk Assessment:** The new assessment was adopted.

**Finance:** Members were satisfied that the present insurance schedule was sufficient. The Clerk would review and decide on most appropriate quote and make the payment for the new insurance before 1st September 2025.

As at 13th June 2025 the bank account held £13,492.96. Expenditure was within budget. The VAT reclaim would be made before the next meeting in September.

**Payments were authorised to:** D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) inv 785 £90.25, H Coonick (Clerk - reimbursement for stationery, stamps, software) £78.26, Arboretum Ltd (Burial Ground tree works planning application) £50.00.

# **CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

# DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING HELD ON 1ST JULY 2025

**Present:** Councillors Mr M Seabrook (Chair), Mrs C Byng, Mr J Caine, Mrs J Disley, Mr A Lewis, Mrs J Mear, Ms J Watts, Mrs J Williams.

In Attendance: Cllr Colin Stanford (Shropshire Council) & H Coonick (Clerk).

**Apologies for Absence:** Mr I Alderson (Vice Chair).

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: None.

**Public Involvement Session:** No members of the public were present.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council meeting held on 3rd June 2025 were approved as being correct and were signed by the Chair.

**Reports from Representatives:** *Shropshire Council* – Cllr Colin Stanford said he was keen that the council responded to the letter from Shropshire Council re partnership (see below). Plans for the North-West Relief Road had been paused whilst the Council considers alternatives. The Highways Team had a general lack of resources. Potholes that were deemed dangerous to road users were prioritised which was why those nearby had not been repaired at the same time. He was concerned that the voice of Parish Councils was not being given high enough priority by the planning team and was aware of proposed changes by the government which might make parishes' views even less important: this was concerning.

**Emergency Plan** – This was deferred to the next meeting.

**Village Hall Committee** – Cllr Mear said H Coonick was now the treasurer. Station Drive Surgery Care Coordinators would be attending the Village Hall to discuss meeting the needs of patients in rural areas and everyone was welcome to attend. The trustees were discussing the fencing of part of the grounds to provide a safe area for children during outside events.

**Flood Action Group** – Cllr Byng said the next meeting would be in September.

**South Shropshire Area Committee** – Cllr Byng would attend the next meeting (on 2nd July) and report to the next Parish Council meeting.

**Highways:** Cllr Byng reported issues with coaches struggling to turn into the grounds of Manor Adventure and causing problems on the B4368. There was concern that Manor Adventure staff were not wearing high visibility jackets when assisting the children to cross the B4368, and they needed to cross at a different point to allow vehicles time to slow down. The Council would write to Manor Adventure inviting them to the next meeting for an update and to raise these issues.

The clerk had met with Nick Newton, Shropshire Council's Traffic Engineer. They had looked at the traffic speed through Seifton and Culmington. He had suggested that it would be possible to reduce the speed to 30mph with buffer zones of 40mph reaching beyond Clay Lane and beyond the present speed limit on the southern end, but this would depend on a survey of traffic speeds. He anticipated that a traffic count budget would be available this year, allowing him to place strips for a survey. Having the signs upgraded to

yellow-backed signs would depend on where potential buffer zones started. He was not convinced that the verge width available would be adequate to accommodate village gateways large enough to be effective and not affected by hedge/verge overgrowth. If the traffic count did show sufficient evidence to support a reduction in the speed limit there would need to be a consultation with the police, parish council and public in the next financial year.

**Expenditure of the Neighbourhood Fund:** Repairs to All Saints' Church – the Council would contribute £1,000 toward the repairs to the tower.

Repairs to the drainage system and installation of a fence at Culmington Village Hall – a contribution of £1,000 would be made, especially as the Parish Council was Custodian Trustee of the Village Hall.

Village Gateways to the west of Culmington Village: The Clerk had discussed the installation with Morville Parish Council who had recently installed such gateways. The cost was likely to be in the region of £3,250. The Police and Crime Commissioner may give a grant towards the cost which would need to be matched by the Parish Council. No decision would be made until the possible changes to speed limits and signs had been decided.

**Waste Bin for the bus shelter in Culmington Village:** It was agreed to purchase a waste bin to be installed on the outside of the bus shelter for no more than £100.

**Defibrillator at Seifton:** The Council would seek permission from the owner and tenant for the possible installation and apply for free defibrillator/cabinet from charity. Cllr Caine raised the possibility of the purchase of a Lifevac to be used during choking incidents.

A new approach to partnership with Town and Parish Councills: Councillors discussed Shropshire Council's letter and the Clerk would respond.

**Finance:** The bank account held £12,806.02 as at 17th June 2025. Expenditure had been within budget. A grant of £750 had been received from Shropshire Council for Environmental Maintenance and a reclaim of VAT for £721.96 would be made before the next meeting. Cllr Disley (nonsignatory) signed the bank reconciliation.

**Payments were authorised to:** H Coonick (stationery and stamps reimbursement) £31.80, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) inv 788 £95.

**Items for the next meeting:** a. Emergency Plan. b. Update on Telephone Box. **Any other business:** The Council would invite the West Mercia Police Neighbourhood Team to attend a future meeting.

Cllr Caine reported issues with children walking along the B4365 to the bus shelter. A letter would be sent to the school asking for them to be picked up nearer their homes where the school bus has previously collected children.

Cllr Mear reported that Mr John Turley had had a very enjoyable time at the Shropshire Lord Lieutenant's Garden Party and thanked the Parish Council for its nomination in recognition of his service of over 55 years as a Parish Councillor.

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
