



CORVEDALE KITCHEN

BLACKBERRY, LIMONCELLO AND MASCARPONE TRIFLE - Sara Thompson

An easy, summery trifle.

INGREDIENTS

100g caster sugar

2 lemons, zested

250g lemon drizzle or Madeira cake

4 tbsp limoncello

300g blackberries

250g mascarpone

200ml fromage frais

142ml double cream

150g lemon curd

METHOD

- 1. Dissolve the sugar in 100ml of water over a low heat.
- 2. Add lemon zest and increase the heat until the mixture boils.
- 3. Simmer for 1 minute until the zest looks translucent, then set aside to cool.
- 4. Cut the cake into large cubes and put it in the bottom of a dish.
- 5. Drizzle with limoncello and top with blackberries.
- 6. Whisk mascarpone, fromage frais and double cream together until light and smooth then partially fold in the lemon curd to create a rippled effect. Spoon over the blackberries.
- 7. Remove the lemon zest from the syrup and arrange on top of the trifle.

CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

I'm writing this in the middle of June and on the day before I will be walking with some of the older children in Corvedale School from Diddlebury to Wilderhope Manor, as part of their residential trip this year. We will walk a route of six miles(ish) that is almost entirely on public footpaths, taking our time as we go. En route we'll look at some mapwork skills as well as looking at what surrounds us. Fortunately, the weather forecast currently looks dry.

This, coupled with the thought that summer is a time when many people go on holiday, prompts me to think about journeys. I spend a lot of my time travelling through the Corvedale, but all too often I'm driving, and my focus is on the road. Walking brings the chance to really appreciate all that surrounds us and to see it from a different viewpoint to normal.

There is a tendency to see a journey as a necessary evil, something to be got through as fast as possible so that we can reach our destination. If you've had to commute to work you will know the feeling well, no matter how nice the route might be. At other times, though, we should be looking at the journey as a more important part of the overall experience; as something to be enjoyed, not endured. As we travel, we have time to appreciate where we are and the people we are with – both those with whom we are travelling and those we meet briefly on the way.

The Bible is full of stories about journeys: if you read the gospels with a map handy you realise how much time Jesus and his disciples must have spent travelling from place to place. As they walked they would have had time to become a group, to chat, to share ideas and to learn. Travelling together will have played a big part in making the disciples who they were.

We often describe life as a journey. It's a journey we only make once. Let's try to make it a journey we enjoy and appreciate in all its fullness, sharing its joys with all those who travel alongside us.

SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL UPDATE

We now have a new addition to the Corvedale family in the form of Cardington and its nearby hamlets. Since the Boundary Commission recommendations in 2024 some local authority areas have been altered to create a more equal number of residents. As a result, Cardington is now represented by the Corvedale Division Councillor. The new geography stretches from Clee Stanton on the side of Titterstone Clee to the old Roman Road near Leebotwood and from the edge of Ludlow Racecourse (literally a few yards from the track!) to the edge of Church Preen and includes a total eleven Parish Councils.

As the new Councillor for the Corvedale, one of my main roles will be to act as a two-way route for information from Shropshire Council to our Parish Councils and residents and to listen to and represent the views and concerns of residents back to the Council. I will also be attending as many Parish Council meetings across the area as I can possibly manage and have also been given a seat on the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee which can look into any aspect of health service provision and make recommendations based on evidence to the Council.

There has been a lot of change in our local authority since the local elections on 6th May with over 50% of the Council consisting of new Council Members, so lots of fresh faces, lots of new ideas but much less experience. Thankfully, we have a very strong team of Council Officers and Executives, and I have been impressed by their positive energy and commitment to serve our communities.

The new administration have set out some ambitions for the future including more work on potholes (acknowledged to be a national problem) and has also warned that they are working within tight financial constraints.

A couple of questions have been raised by local residents about the Shrewsbury Northwest Relief Road and as you will have seen in the press this is on hold at present pending discussions between the new Council Leader and Government. I have also been asked about the situation with Shropdoc and received an update. At the time of writing a report into possible options is awaited but hasn't been published yet. The update was at pains to emphasise that this was not about cost cutting but about providing the best possible service for out-of-hours care.

VACANCY FOR A COUNCILLOR

At the elections on 1st May 2025 only eight candidates put themselves forward for election to the parish council, which leaves us with one vacancy to fill. We therefore invite one resident of our parish to put themselves forward to be coopted as a councillor. As the hamlets of Westhope, Sutton, Middlehope and Peaton are not represented on the Council, we would especially welcome applicants from those areas. Set out below are the criteria for eligibility to serve as a candidate.

If you are a British or Commonwealth citizen, citizen of the Republic of Ireland or a European Union citizen who has attained the age of 18 years and either:-

- You are registered as a local government elector for the Parish of Diddlebury, or for at least 12 months have occupied as owner or tenant land or other premises in the parish, or
- Your main occupation has been in the Parish for the last 12 months, or
- You have resided in the Parish or within three miles of its boundaries for at least 12 months and are not disqualified from holding office by reason of any disqualification set out in the Local Government Act 1972, which include

bankruptcy, county court orders, non-payment of council taxes, being found guilty of corrupt or illegal practices in election law, then you would be eligible to stand as a co-opted Councillor Diddlebury Parish Council.

We hold generally 10 meetings each year which alternate between Diddlebury and Westhope Village Halls.

CRAVEN ARMS GOOD NEIGHBOURS

WHO ARE WE?

Craven Arms Good Neighbours Scheme in South Shropshire incorporates the Voluntary Car Scheme, which covers the Wistanstow, Aston-on-Clun areas and the Corvedale as far as Munslow. The scheme was first set up in 2003. We are a voluntary, non-funded, not-for-profit group.

We are a team of local volunteers who give their time freely to help others.

We undertake tasks for people who have difficulty accessing public transport.

Although usually offering help on weekdays we may be able to help at weekends should a volunteer be available.

We are members of the Shropshire Community Car Scheme and the county wide group 'Community Resource.'



We can offer help with:

- transport to appointments (hospital, doctor or hairdresser)
- going shopping (or collecting it)
- collecting prescriptions
- changing library books

In fact, whatever your short-term need if you are stuck, give us a call. Please give us as much notice as possible and inform us of any mobility issues. Even if we can't help we might know someone who can.

Our volunteers carry ID cards and where appropriate have been DBS checked by Shropshire Council.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

There is a fixed charge of £2.50 for help within Craven Arms. For longer trips we charge per mile; our drivers will calculate the cost.

For example: if you live in Craven Arms currently the cost to Ludlow is under £5, to Church Stretton is under £6 and to Shrewsbury is £14. Some slight variations may occur due to driver starting points.

Any additional donations are always gratefully received. These help to offset the costs of providing the service. We provide receipts for all monies received at the point of payment.

If you need some assistance and live within 6 miles of Craven Arms please call 01588 673 732. Our telephone line is open weekdays between 9am and 12noon. Where possible please call at least 48 hours before help is required, especially for transport. A volunteer will take your request and, if required, give an estimate of the likely charge. They will then seek a suitable volunteer who will contact you to confirm details.

We cannot guarantee to fulfil every request for help but will try out utmost to do so.

CAN YOU HELP?

Volunteering for Good Neighbours will give you immense satisfaction and helps our clients maintain their independence and enables us to thrive. Everyone involved with Craven Arms Good Neighbours is a volunteer. We urgently need, will welcome and support new helpers, particularly drivers. Each new volunteer helps to reduce the load on those involved in providing this valued service.

DO YOU DRIVE AND HAVE YOUR OWN CAR?

Most of or clients are unable to access public transport and may even need assistance getting into a car or into a venue. Would you consider taking people to medical appointments or to shops and other services? You can decide whether you wish to do long or short journeys, whatever you prefer and whenever you can. This position requires a DBS check which we will arrange and pay for. We will pay you 50p per mile to cover your mileage cost.

DO YOU HAVE A TELEPHONE?

Could you be a telephone co-ordinator manning a 3 hour shift twice a month, taking requests and finding volunteers to fill them. Even one shift a month would make a huge difference. All necessary training and support (including insurance) is provided.

The style of the garden is relaxed with a mixture of informal and formal and includes a national collection of over 150 cultivars of Iris. Chris Eldon came along to talk to the branch at our June meeting with humorous and intriguing anecdotes from his fifty years in broadcasting. The meeting went well with fifteen in attendance. Chris was well received and at least half the members present remembered him from his work with Radio Shropshire - and they recognised a good few of the people he featured in his slides.

A number of members attended the SFWI AGM held on 15th May in Theatre Severn. An exceptionally good day was enjoyed by all, the highlight being a talk by the very entertaining and engaging speaker, Dr Mark Spencer. His talk 'Murder most

Florid' outlined his background, education and career up until he fell into his current role as a botanist working with the Police - and the dead - in the world of criminal forensics. All extremely interesting if not a little gruesome!

In June's article I wrote about our own member Ria Baxter's talk entitled 'Why Did They Leave My Dad Behind.' I mentioned we were all intrigued by this title – what it meant, where and when Ria's father was 'left behind' and whether this story was going to have a happy or unhappy ending. Unfortunately, and with regret, however, I omitted to include the correct facts surrounding Ria's parents, how they met and some dates. I sincerely apologise for these mistakes and have now included the corrections Ria has given me herewith:

'Ria's Dad was Chinese, and her Mum was Dutch. At the end of 1939, her Dad managed to get passage on one of the ships out of Shanghai heading for England. He was only 17, but he forged his papers by changing the year of his birth from 1922 to 1920. He arrived in England and was part of the Allied war effort, alongside 20,000 Chinese seamen working in the shipping industry out of Liverpool. Working below deck in the engine rooms, these men died in their thousands on the perilous Atlantic runs under heavy attack from German U-boats. Despite this, Chinese seafarers often worked longer hours, were granted less shore leave and paid far lower wages than their European counterparts, usually about a third of the wage of a European of the same rank. They were not paid the war risk bonus either. In February 1942, a number of Chinese sailors went on strike to protest the iniquity. The strike continued until that April, at which point the sailors were awarded a pay increase of £2 a month and the standard £10 a month war risk bonus. The sailors had to work away from the places they had made their homes for often up to a year at a time, never knowing if they would return home, sometimes transporting soldiers overseas into extremely dangerous waters while keeping the military supplied too. Many of these seamen had met and married local women in the Liverpool area and established families. Despite this, after the war in 1946 the Liverpool Constabulary, acting on orders from the British government under a scheme known as 'Compulsory Repatriation of Undesirable Chinese Seamen', forcibly deported around 2000 Chinese sailors from Liverpool back to China in what was seen as a demobilisation effort. Ria doesn't know the reason her father wasn't repatriated. It could be because he was away at sea at the time, or because he had a lot of potential, as he quickly rose to number one and was in charge of the Chinese crew, or that he was never militant, so didn't join in the strike of 1942. He worked for the Blue Funnel Line until 1966, having gained British Citizenship for himself and Ria's Mum, who moved permanently to England in 1962 from Amsterdam.'

MUSINGS ON LIFE...

MORE STUFF

To witness the overwhelming intelligence of nature is unlike anything else. Even viewing starlings murmurating around the front in Aberystwyth is never to be forgotten. I finished twittering on last month about Clive Myrie and our television. Any jungle dweller spending his whole life unaware of the outside world would have no difficulty in believing Clive lived in that television... highly reasonable (he may, though, wonder why he only appears at 10pm!).

In May a few of us got together to talk about the structure of the head and brain. It was a free-wheeling discussion, though, so we touched on memory, consciousness and the like. Now, we are the 10th or maybe the 15th generation of those who believe that all mental activity originates inside our skull. This is the *most* miserable of beliefs: it means that the death of a person is an end. Let us take something we think we all understand; memory. Human babies, we believe, have about 60 billion brain cells. At birth they are technically demented, and as far as we know new-borns cannot retain memory.

That's ok we would think: they will develop if all goes well, and the nerve cells will start to make connections. Conventionally, we say they are now able to *lay down* memories (like a fine wine perhaps?). Yet there is no memory storage cabinet in the brain, only connections. If there are chemical traces representing memories, where are they? And why have they not been discovered despite decades of trying? I am saying that conventional science cannot in any way explain memory, consciousness or soul.

We are forced to consider biological fields; no surprise there. After all, we all believe in physical fields. Which one of us when we throw a ball in the air even bothers to think whether it will return to earth? We are unshakeable believers in gravity. Yet where is this gravity? Can you buy a pack of it? Does it come plastic wrapped in the supermarket? We believe it exists because of the effect it has.

Over one hundred years ago the philosopher Karl Jung postulated that human archetypes and myths arose because of a common unconscious link among human beings. Indigenous peoples would have no interest in such an idea; why bother to state something so obvious? They, and indeed many people in the non-modern western world thoroughly understand the connection between people, animals, plants,

throughout all wide nature on the earth. Many of us have experienced such connections for ourselves and they are at odds often with our 'education.' We cannot prove links exist extending beyond our brains; they are implicit, not explicit, maybe incomplete, hard to tie down, whimsical, or even paradoxical yet, in human context. A list of all the things that make life worth living? They are not data points. Yet, we believe in them through experience, just like gravity.

The trouble is that human beings are really good at making machines. We are mesmerised by the false belief that we ourselves are machine-like and we can be made whole by correcting a chemical process, unblocking an artery, replacing a joint or swallowing a pill.

So, is Myrie in the telly or are we tuning into something bigger? Is the whole world connected? While giving two stark choices is probably nonsensical, if there is something wonderfully bigger than our own inside-the-skull processes what is it?

One postulate is biological fields. When we face something we cannot understand, all we can do is speak in metaphor. It's like this...it has this effect...here is an analogy.... Yet now there are those who are sparking increasing interest in biologic forces that shape and connect. We know that all matter resonates, is never still and a German physicist told us energy and matter were interchangeable. Dynamic resonant movement is common to our brains and the whole world, perhaps it is a matter of what we tune into? The vast majority of people have always understood belonging to a wider reality... it just seems many of us think we are walled-off, isolated. It will change; it has to!

BEE AWARE



Most of us know bees are important for pollinating crops and the flowers and produce in our gardens. However, often when people think of bees they only consider honeybees. These are the ones that live in hives, are kept by beekeepers and are often moved around the country by them as needed

to pollinate farmers' crops. However British honeybees are just a single species of social bee that we have effectively domesticated for this purpose, and this single species produces all the British honey we consume.

In addition to honeybees it is relatively easy to spot bumblebees as they have a low humming buzz and are generally big and fluffy compared to honeybees. In Britain we have 24 species of bumblebee all from the genus Bombus, down from 27 former species due to nationwide extinctions, and there are only about eight species that you are likely to see in your gardens.

Bumblebees live socially, like honeybees do, with a queen, her many daughters – called workers, and later in the season her few sons. If you watch the bumblebees in your garden you will see similar marked bees some of whom are very large – generally the queens and many smaller ones – the workers. Most bumblebees live in holes in the ground (often previous mouse or vole holes) or tufts of long grass, and feed on pollen from a wide variety of native plants, many we consider to be weeds.

You may be surprised to hear that, in Britain, there are around another 225 species of wild bee aside from these 2 commonly known groups. These are generally referred to as solitary bees, though a few do have a social structure, and some nest so close together they seem like a single colony; mostly they lay single eggs in a cell they fill with pollen. These can be found in holes in the ground, hollow stems, gaps in stonework and most other crevices which are left undisturbed. They come in a range of sizes from just a couple of millimetres long to

almost honeybee size and a variety of colourations. Often they look like wasps – from whom they have evolved. Some feed only on a single species of plant and so become critically endangered or locally extinct if that plant is eradicated from an area. All are subject to the vagaries of the weather and suffered a horrible wet Spring in 2024 – though a much better one this year, touch wood.

All these bees are critically important for pollenisation as well as for biodiversity. It is often difficult for bees to find the patches of weeds and wildflowers they need for food, and the scruffy grass, dead hollow stems or bare patches of ground that they use to make their homes. It is important then that we try to provide these habitats and food sources in our gardens, leave dead stems,



don't tidy all the leaves and debris away – bees may be hibernating there. Grow a wide variety of flowers that bees can use (look for the bee symbol when you buy a plant) and allow some weedy areas where natural wildflowers like clover, trefoil, oxeye daisies and thistles can grow. The longer we can keep that vibrant buzz alive in our gardens the better off nature will be and so will we.



There being no further business the meeting closed at 19:46.

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Public invited to speak on any issues: Mr Cooper would have liked to speak about a planning application in February; however, the website showed no meeting until April. They had owned the barn since 2012, the original plan included a garage, but they were advised to remove it. They would like a garage for classic cars and machinery for the three acres. The planning officer proposed moving to a standalone storage shed. He said the Shropshire Hills design guide supported the application. The rooms above would utilise the roof space for independent living for the applicant's 96year old father. They had zero interest in Airbnb. The reason for the appeal was due to frustration with Shropshire Council planning and conservation, who refused to attend site visits which would show the situation of the garage below the barn. The applicant was seeking a detailed response so he knew how to move forward. The Chair apologised that an additional meeting had been arranged, but the Clerk had invited the applicant via the planning application email contact. Cllr Price responded that drainage was already a big problem in the location so that needed to be rectified first. There had already been many developments within the immediate area. The original barn should be built out first. A member of the public was worried that many applicants would say comments re intentions and family were often unreliable at this stage.

Declaration of interest: Cllr Yarwood is the applicant for the planning application below.

Minutes of the meeting held on 27th February 2025 were read by the Chair and were unanimously agreed.

Reports: Cllr Colin Stanford introduced himself as the new Shropshire Council representative. He was keen for feedback. There had been large staffing cutbacks at Shropshire Council: from 20 to 12 in executive staff.

Finance: Cheques requested and receipts: The balance as at 2nd May 2025 was £8,103.51. Payments agreed were: Insurance £527.18, Clerk's wages £217.50. ICO £52.00 and SALC affiliation £169.76. The Clerk would seek advice from SALC re ICO requiring payment. Clerk's wages would remain the same £15/hr and 1 hour/week, plus expenses.

Planning Application: Reference: 25/00997/FUL (validated: 17/04/2025) Address: Nordy View, Abdon, Craven Arms, Shropshire, SY7 9HX. Proposal: Change of use of first floor of domestic outbuilding into holiday let (retrospective). Applicant: Mr Christopher Yarwood, 11 St Marys Place, Shrewsbury, SY1 1DZ. Cllr Yarwood explained the application: only for two people from September to May. Everything will remain the same to the building, as children and family stay in it sometimes now. Cllr Yarwood left the meeting. Two members of the public had no objection: however, they were disappointed that Cllr Yarwood didn't realise the restriction beforehand. Cllr Uffold proposed support: the building was already there, and it was only a change of use. He felt it a genuine error not realising it was restricted. Unanimously agreed support.

Cllr Lewis raised the issue of non-material amendments at Brown Clee. Why wasn't the PC consulted? The Clerk would raise with Shropshire Council and Shropshire Cllr Stanford.

Phone Box Proposals: Tugford phone box was on the removal list: an email objection had been received and circulated. There was evidence of no use: the majority had mobile phones. It was unanimously agreed not to object to removal of the phone and box.

Highway Issues and Notice Board Repairs: HMG 1 Brookhouse ditch from pleaching to bridge. 2 Bottom of Masseys Bank: outlet blocked: Cllr Lewis would liaise with the landowner. 3 Drain blocked by Earnstrey Hill House. 4 Abdon Church both sides. Cllrs would report back to Clerk of any other ditching needed by Friday. HM Grant discussed: £750 match funded like last time was proposed by Cllr Lewis and unanimously agreed. Cllr Uffold offered his services for future quotes. Notice boards were discussed and it was unanimously agreed to accept Mr A. Whitehead's quote. Cllr Uffold will action.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Apologies: Cllr T O'Boyle.

In attendance: The Clerk, and for part of the meeting former Shropshire Cllr Cecilia Motley and Cllr Colin Stanford, newly elected Corvedale Division Shropshire Councillor, and two members of the public.

Cllr Stanford introduced himself and gave a brief report: the Chairman thanked him for attending and welcomed him to the parish.

Annual Parish Meeting Reports were delivered by the Chairman, by former Cllr Cecilia Motley, by Cllr Clive Martyn for the Flood Action Group, by Cllr Martyn in his role as DPC's website manager, and by Cllr O'Boyle representing the Louisa Powell Almshouse Charity. All the reports are available to view on DPC's website. There being no further business to conduct the Chairman closed the APM at 8.10pm and proceeded with the Annual Parish Council Meeting.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Election of Officers: Cllr Hedgley was elected as Chairman for the 2025 - 2026 year and Cllr Robert Povall as Vice-Chairman. Both duly signed their Declaration of Acceptance of Office forms.

Cllrs Watson, S Povall, Morgan, Rattu, and Martyn had all been re-elected unopposed in the May elections and signed their Declarations of Acceptance of Office forms: Cllr O'Boyle would sign his at the next meeting. The new online format of the DPI forms was discussed. Tim Pardoe did not stand for re-election and so the one vacancy on the council had been advertised and it was hoped a ninth councillor would be co-opted in due course.

Declarations of Interest: Cllr S Povall declared an interest in the planning application 25/01367/REM and left the room whilst the application was discussed and voted on.

Minutes of the meeting held on 23rd April 2025 were approved and five

matters arising were dealt with.

Appointment of Representatives: Cllr S Povall was nominated and voted to be Tree Warden; Cllr. Martyn was nominated and voted as representative to the Flood Action Group and as the DPC Website Manager; Cllr. Rattu would represent DPC on the DVH Committee when available; Cllr O'Boyle was nominated and voted as representative of the Louisa Powell Almshouse Charity; Mrs K Worthington will represent Westhope Village Hall.

Planning Matters: 25/01570/PMBPA – an application for prior approval for the conversion of an agricultural building to a single dwelling house at The Barracks, Westhope, did not require a decision from DPC as Shropshire Council had already refused permission for it.

Application 25/01367/REM for approval of reserved matters (layout, scale, appearance etc) of an agricultural worker's retirement dwelling of 120 sq metres at Corfton Farm was considered and supported by the councillors.

Communications & Correspondence: Ten items were considered and noted.

Highways and Environmental Matters: The proposed new pipework/ borehole works at the Severn Trent pumping station were on hold awaiting a licence. A notice board for Bache Mill was discussed and Cllr Martyn was tasked with selecting a suitable metal framed one for around £400 and bringing details of it to a DPC meeting for approval. It was noted that Sutton also needed a new notice board, the current one being dilapidated.

Finance Report for May 2025: Cheques totalling £1,610.31 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds of £10,757.18 including ring fenced and third party funds. Payment of the 2025-2026 Precept and the VAT reclaim are awaited.

2024-2025 Audit: DPC considered the two audit reports prepared by the internal auditor, Mrs J Griffiths: her comments about the low level of reserves being carried forward were noted and would be considered again in January when the 2026/2027 Precept would be set.

The Annual Governance return had been audited and approved by Mrs Griffiths. Sections 1 and 2 were duly approved and signed the Clerk and Chairman, and the Public Rights Notice would be posted on 1st June 2025.

Dates for meeting from May 2025 to May 2026: The list of dates was approved and would be posted on the website.

Any Other Business: The Chairman and his wife had enjoyed their visit to

Buckingham Palace for a garden party at which HM King Charles, Queen Camilla and several other members of the royal family had been present.

Cllr Rattu raised an issue about notices from other Corvedale parishes being removed from DPC notice boards. It was emphasised that the notice boards are primarily for DPC business and any additional space is for anyone in the Corvedale to utilise.

The Chairman briefly reported on the planning application at Green Farm being rejected by the planners, which he had been challenging. He had had discussions about a potential councillor to fill the current vacancy. He and Cllr Martyn had viewed and discussed a potential problem with the bank of

the stream at Peaton Strand.

There being no further business to conduct, the meeting was closed at 9.30pm.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Wednesday 25th June 2025, commencing at 7.30pm at Westhope Village Hall.

Co-option to the Vacant Seat on the Council: Councillors interviewed Mr Stuart Rowbotham about what skills and interests he could bring to the role of councillor. It was resolved to co-opt Mr Rowbotham to the council with immediate effect. Cllr Rowbotham joined the meeting.

Nature Recovery Strategy: Mike Kelly gave a presentation. Parish Councils were in a unique position to support the nature recovery process and had a hugely important role to play in bringing stakeholders together to develop plans for managing existing and creating new natural assets. He suggested that the Parish Council might be interested in a starting a group which could develop a parish nature recovery plan which would set out how the parish wanted to protect, manage and improve nature within the parish. He presented maps of the parish showing natural assets which would be a starting point for a plan. This will be an item on the next meeting agenda.

Reports: Shropshire Council - Cllr Stanford had sent apologies.

 $Munslow\ Village\ Hall$ – Cllr Dobson reported there would be a nature walk on 14th June and teas at the hall afterwards. The Crown Inn would be hosting a cream tea at 3pm on 29th June.

Finance: Review the Internal Auditor's Report: Mr Adams reported that the controls in place were sufficient for the Council's purposes during 2024-25. He suggested that the council consider whether the reserves were appropriate and sufficient for future needs. The report was noted.

Annual Governance Statement: There was a sound system of internal control, including arrangements for the preparation of the Accounting Statements and the chair signed the statement.

Annual Accounting Statement: It was confirmed that the statement was correct and the chair signed the statement.

Exemption Certificate: The council's income and expenditure for 2024-25 did not exceed £25,000 and it was eligible to certify itself as exempt from external audit. The certificate was signed by the chair.

Notice of Public Rights would start on 30th June and end on 8th August 2025.

Payments were authorised to: D Lewis (environmental maintenance) inv 762 £109.25; H Coonick and HMRC, Clerk's salary April - June £933.40 and travel expenses £36.90.

Highways: The environmental maintenance contractor would check the verges on Park Lane in Munslow.

Update on Response from Stuart Anderson MP re Use of Agricultural Ground for Non-Agricultural Purposes: Stuart Anderson MP replied that 'Championing Farmers' and 'Protecting our Countryside' were two of his six priorities for South Shropshire. He stated that he would continue to oppose good agricultural land being used for such things as solar farms. He had agreed to write to the Department of the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs to understand whether there were flaws in the grant-awarding system that are counterproductive. When a further response is received it would be added to a future agenda.

Repairs to the Community Car Park at Munslow: The council was not in a financial position to make the substantial repairs required and, as it did not own the land, it could not seek grants for the repairs.

It was agreed to remove the Munslow Parish Council community car park sign. If any person or body attempted to take ownership of the car park the council would consider taking action to protect it and retain it as a community car park.

Registration of new lease for Munslow Village Hall: The Clerk had contacted the Land Registry in March and May 2025 to enquire on progress of registration of the new lease without a result. She would contact them again in September.

Application to remove the registration of the Washwell: The Land Registry had reported that an application had been made in 2017 to acquire the title by adverse possession and a survey had been undertaken by Ordnance Survey. In its view the land had been incorporated into the garden of the adjoining property and had been so for many years. The evidence provided by the Parish Council that the Washwell was public land was not sufficient to challenge the fact that the applicant had not been in exclusive occupation of the land. It was agreed not to further challenge the registration.

Minutes of the Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council meetings held on 13th May 2025 were approved as being correct and were signed by the Chair.

Reports from Members:

Shropshire Council - Cllr Colin Stanford had sent apologies.

Village Hall Committee - Cllr Mear reported that the AGM had been held on 20th May and they had a strong committee. They were planning events for all ages. The Beefy Boys had been a very well attended event. They were struggling to get grants. The number of bookings had increased.

Flood Action Group - Cllr Byng had sent apologies. Cllr Disley reported that the FAG had a joint meeting with the Ludlow Flood Action Group to explore common ground. The Environment Agency had identified properties at risk of flooding and had written to the owners offering grants but with little notice, so the timescale has been extended.

Complaint to Shropshire Council re blocked bridleway: Parish Councils were not able to make complaints to Unitary or County Councils and the complaint had been referred by the council to the Outdoor Partnership Team Manager. He had responded, saying that the team was trying to

manage within its budget. He had suggested that the parish council write to Cllr James Owen, the Shropshire Council portfolio holder for Housing and Leisure. The parish council would do so.

Repairs to the Bus Shelter: Minor repairs were needed and a new coat of preservative was required. This item was deferred to the next meeting.

Finance: From the Annual Report: for the year 2024-25 income had been £9,851 and expenditure £9,695. Assets amounted to £311,376 including the lease for Culmington Village Hall.

The internal auditor did not raise any concerns.

The Annual Governance Statement was signed as the council considered that there was a sound system of internal control in place.

The Annual Accounting Statement was signed as it presented fairly the financial position of the authority.

The gross income and expenditure for 2024-25 were below £25,000 and the council fulfilled the eligibility requirements to certify itself as exempt from a limited assurance review and the Certificate of Exemption was signed.

The Accounts and Governance Accountability Return (AGAR) would be published with the Notice of Public Rights on the Parish Council website, and also on Parish Council notice boards. The dates for the notices would be 30th June to 8th August 2025.

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
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
