





CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

Looking back, I am somewhat startled to find that this is the fourteenth September in which I have written a letter as the parish priest for the Corvedale. I have to say that I'm not really sure where thirteen years went! In September 2012, I wrote a bit about who I am and about my career up to that point and then I wrote about change and the importance of us, as Christians, witnessing to the love and power of God.

Thirteen years on, much has changed as we look around us locally – old friends have moved away or died, new friends have moved in, new houses have been built, church buildings have been repaired (there is still more to do); we can all add things to this list. Other things have stayed the same, and we can list those too.

Through it all, the main purpose of the church hasn't changed – we continue to be here for anyone in the parishes who wishes to come and share in what we do as we do our best to witness to the love and power of God. We are here for the celebrations in life and for those times when life is tough. Most weeks there is at least one service which uses the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. This uses language which is traditional and beautiful and has been used in these churches for generations. Other services use more contemporary language, which we may find easier to understand. Messy Church uses a format which is completely different, with crafts and activities before a story and a shared meal – and helps new generations to know not only that church is a place which it can be good to go to but also helps them to learn some of the stories from the Bible which help us to know God.

All of this is part of the story of the church here in the Corvedale – we invite you to be part of the coming chapters in that story as we continue to do our best to share the love of God with all those who would like to accept it.

VJ DAY CELEBRATIONS AT CULMINGTON CHURCH

The accompanying photo is of the small but moving service held on Friday 15th August to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the end of the war in Japan. The church bells were rung at 10.30am and this was followed by a small service of prayer. Flags were draped over the altar rails and a shield painted red with 'VJ' intertwined was also displayed.

The story behind this shield is that it was prepared and painted in 1945 to mark this rather sombre occasion after the dropping of the two atomic bombs. When Jeremy Hardwick married Val on VJ day in 1980 his father presented them with the shield to mark a happier occasion.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP



Saturday 9th August saw thirty-one members of the group head to Brooches House, Craven Arms in the glorious sunshine to explore the herbaceous borders, rose beds, lawns and terraces plus the beautiful view towards the Stretton hills. We were made very welcome by Anthony and Julia who were given the derelict cottage soon after their marriage. They rebuilt it in 1985 with much of the stone for the house and surrounds sourced locally, including the old Craven Arms station.

As many gardens do, the design of this one has changed over the years to its current layout which since 2020 includes the five acres adjoining the house. habitats and the 'hobbit hut', a human habitat for wining, dining and enjoying the view. There are many seating areas

around the garden for those moments when there is no more gardening to do... or does that ever happen? The flourishing herbaceous beds include a range of traditional plants including

dahlias; the occasional sculpture and the feature rose bed of Olivia Rose Austin which has a light fragrance and flowers most of the season. The visit was a delight for everyone, and the walk around was followed by delicious coffee and cake.

delicious spread cooked by one of our members. Sitting on an extremely hot day in the shade of a gazebo, we enjoyed catching up and exchanging news.





Dear Friends,

I have often wondered what I should write as a 'Farewell Letter' - or indeed whether I should write one at all. I can say that my seven years here have not been altogether easy, but they have been great in the sense that I, somewhat raw from a different kind of ministry, have learnt a great deal. I am not sure what has been achieved, but I like to think that we now have a slightly different attitude towards our churches and what they stand for. What I mean is that in the past, what I meet is that in the past, the old principle of one clergyman per village was the rule. With a small parish, a priest had the time, and was often the best person available to organise and run all church activities, with the result that the church was very "Vicarage centred". This type of ministry is becoming less and less possible: in the greater part of

becoming less and less possible: in the greater part of the country it has gone completely and I doubt if it is suitable for modern generations.

I am sure that if their faith is to come alive, people need much more involvement with their church: they must have a hand in planning everything from church services to youth clubs - including the Mothers' Union. But of course they must also be keen christians who are really alive to what the church ought to be doing at the present time.

The Church does not exist to form a little 'club' of people who all agree with each other and who are not really interested in anyone who doesn't fit in. The Church exists to witness, proclaim and maintain the work of Christ. Caring for the faithful is an important

function, but only part of the whole job: caring for ancient buildings is also important, but much further down on the list.

If the church is to be really alive, its members must look upon themselves as belonging to a movement constantly seeking new ways of witnessing to Christ in an age of Godlessness and materialism.

On the whole I am sure it is a good thing that there are not quite so many clergy available for small parishes. It can mean that people have to ask themselves, possibly for the first time, 'What does God want me to do as a christian; as a member of - Church?'

I would like to think that this is in the minds

of many of our members and we are not still trying to perpetuate or re-create a type of church life common in the last century.

I am conscious of many failings as your parish priest - especially if some have felt that I have had no time to see them.

I expect you will be glad to know that, although no new incumbent is in sight as yet, Canon Roger Baines has been given pastoral oversight of the parishes for the time being. He will be responsible for all services except the 8 a.m. celebrations at Diddlebury which will be covered by the Stokesay clergy. He will also be looking after the home communicants.

Further details about the interregnum are included in this magazine. From me there is one more 'Thank you', - this time to the Staff and children of Munslow School who gave me a lovely tray and 'The Book of British Birds'. As with the wild flowers, there won't british birds. As with the wild llowers, there won' be namy interesting specinens to see in Hammersnith - mostly pigeons and 'sparrers' but I shall enjoy

I hope this is not my last word in 'Corve News and that I may be allowed a few lines in the next issue.

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CREAMY COURGETTE LASAGNE

This is a great recipe for using up a glut of courgettes. It goes really well with a green salad or a tomato and red onion salad, with balsamic vinegar and olive oil.

INGREDIENTS - Serves 4

- 9 dried lasagne sheets
- 1 tbsp sunflower oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 700g courgette, coarsely grated
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 250g tub ricotta
- 50g cheddar

For the tomato sauce

- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 400g tin chopped tomatoes
- 1 tbsp tomato puree
- 1 tbsp olive oil

Or you could use a 350g jar of ready-made tomato sauce

METHOD

- 1. Heat oven to 220°C/fan 200°C/gas mark 7.
- 2. First make the tomato sauce:
 - I. Heat the olive oil in a frying pan and sweat the onion for 10 minutes or so until soft and translucent.
 - II. Add the garlic and cook for a further 2 minutes
 - III. Add the tomato puree and tinned tomatoes and bring to a simmer
 - IV. If using a ready-made tomato sauce heat in small saucepan till hot
- 3. Put a large pan of water on to boil, then add the lasagne sheets one at time, stir vigorously and cook for about 5 minutes until soft, but not cooked through. Rinse in cold water, then drizzle with a little oil to stop them sticking together.
- 4. Heat the oil in a large frying pan, add the onion and fry for 10 minutes. Add the courgettes and garlic and continue to fry until the courgette has softened.
- 5. Stir in two-thirds of both the ricotta and the cheddar, and season to taste.
- 6. In a large baking dish, layer up the lasagne, starting with half the courgette mix, then pasta, then tomato sauce. Repeat and top with blobs of the remaining ricotta, then scatter with the rest of the cheddar.
- 7. Bake on the top shelf for about 15-20 minutes until the pasta is tender and the cheese is golden.


CORVEDALE FOOTPATH & MAINTENANCE GROUP

DORMICE ON OUR DOORSTEPS

Few people have seen a Hazel Dormouse before. They are secretive little creatures, mainly active during the night, arboreal (living in trees and hedges) and hibernating for many months. Also, their numbers have seen a dramatic, nationwide decline since the 1950s.

But here around the Clee Hills, Corvedale and Wenlock Edge, we have some strongholds of this



gingery, fuzzy tailed, wide-eyed mouse. Following on from the Abdon & District Wildlife Group's Dormouse project, more and more local people are out looking for the tell-tale signs that we are sharing our landscape with this delightful little creature and many landowners are taking practical steps; planting hedgerows, erecting nest boxes and coppicing woodland, to support the survival of this species.



Late summer/early autumn is the best time of year to go on a nibbled nut hunt. Dormice eat hazelnuts in a very distinctive way, creating a very neat smooth holes, with external teeth marks at a 45-degree angle to the hole edge. They look like perfect little clogs. Find a fruiting hazel tree and search the surrounding ground for any nibbled nuts.

As part of our dormouse surveying in the area, we are also deploying footprint tunnels, allowing us to take prints of mice feet as they move through the hedge network, searching for natural nests, checking nest boxes and using specially adapted trail cameras and bait stations.

Dormice have a couple of things that are crucial to their survival. They need a succession of food across the year, so diversity in plant species is very important. When they awake from hibernation in March/April they are starving and have used up most of their energy reserves getting through the winter. At this time, early spring flowering trees and bushes, as a source of nectar, are really important for them. Next comes the summer when insect numbers are increasing. Having trees with larger leaves, which attract caterpillars provides a good food source. Autumn can be a bountiful time, providing a good number of berries and nuts, allowing them to fatten up for winter.

Habitat connectivity is the second most important thing for dormice. They prefer not to go to ground, so having copses, spinneys and woodlands, connected by nice bushy hedge corridors, is really important to allow genetics to move between populations. We have a good population of dormice around Ditton Priors; can these mice share their genetics with those dormice on Wenlock Edge? Or around to the other side of the Brown Clee?

That is my hope and aim, that by working with local people, landowners and funders, we can create 'bushy belts' across the landscape, providing a connected landscape of food and nesting habitats for these beautiful creatures to not just survive, but thrive.

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MUSINGS ON LIFE...

AS THE OX PLOUGHS, SO PLOUGH WE? AND YOUR HOMEWORK FOR NEXT TIME!

As you read this your eye travels from left to right and from the top of the page to the bottom. If it were not so you would be totally disorientated. But it was not always like this.

It is thought that every society making the decision to write started writing in columns conveying thoughts pictorially, which are called 'pictograms.' Many eastern languages still write so and then read right to left.

Once writing became phonetic (sounds represented language) it became horizontal, possibly in Greece about 3,000 years ago. Then, about two and a half thousand years ago something strange occurred. People in the western world started scribing right to left but when they got to the left margin they carried on and returned in the opposite direction. This is referred to as boustropedon, which means 'as the ox ploughed.' It seems that the Greeks pinched huge amounts of technical stuff from that ancient hotspot of culture, Mesopotamia, 'the land between the rivers' (Tigris and Euphrates). They then recorded this in their own language but obviously thought it was fine to change the whole writing system. There is a technical name for this sort of thing – a flaming nerve!

This ox stuff should mean something to us. For 1,000 years England fed itself as the ox ploughs, forming ridges ploughing in alternate directions up and down the field giving the characteristic 'ridge and furrow 'pattern. Locally



it is still possible to see these earthworks in some conditions. Here is an aerial photograph near Abdon showing fragments of ridge and furrow.

Apparently, ox plough writing didn't last long in the western world. It was replaced by the modern left-to-right script.

A few months ago, a small group of friends and I just happened to get on to the subject of the human split brain, where the intellectual part is very decidedly divided into left and right. This is referring to the super-intelligent bit that we name the cerebral hemispheres at the top of the brain which look rather like two over-sized walnuts. Only superficially are these symmetrical and, as for the way they function, that could hardly be more different. Now, this is a bit complex


and beyond a short article, but a lot of fascinating modern work has shown interesting traits of the two sides of the brain which have superseded the old notion that the left brain was magisterially objective and right brain gushingly emotional.

This is a simplification, but it is more that the right brain takes the wider view, sees the artistic parallels and understands metaphor and the implicit: it gets the joke! The left side is executive – so we need it – but it doesn't easily take criticism and will grab at the ready answer. It is acquisitive and understands only the explicit and is unstably emotional.

Even if these are only summaries it seems pretty clear that we need the right side to ultimately rule the roost and many people are pointing out that the modern world increasingly looks like an unhealthy win for the left brain.

Here we have a problem! It has also been shown that the right brain prefers scanning a column and the left brain to scan horizontally from left to right, so maybe those old oxploughers have something to answer for.

No one would offer toffee for my drawings, but here is a crude representation of the information 'coming' from the right and left eye – retinae-optic tracts – brain (if in black and white, blue will be darker than red).



So here is your homework for next time (beware: there could be spot checks at any time!). Firstly, looking at the diagram and try to work out the effect of viewing something with your head in straight ahead position but swivelling your eyes to the left or right. Then work out what happens if your turn your head to view to the left or to the right.

The second part is to find a picture on the internet of the very famous representation of 'The Last Supper,' by Da Vinci and think about the two groups of disciples and what messages they are giving and receiving both by direction of vision and body language. Do you begin to see any pattern?

I hope all this will be a fun game for friends, family and neighbours, but actually there may be something important here!

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE

The First of September falls on a Monday this year. I like this, and find it neat and tidy! I also like September as it's like New Year – but not with capital letters. It marks the end of summer, too, as we wrap up the season and put it away until next year. The return to work after the holidays, the infants back to school, the children nervously starting 'big' school, mums are back to packing lunches, dads are sorting out the sports kits as the winter games change places with their summer cousins and so the year (sort of) starts again. It's another chance to make some resolutions.

So what else can September offer? For seventeen churches in Shropshire it's the time they celebrate the saint's day their church building is dedicated to; so five St Giles, one St Gregory the Great, one St Edith and ten St Michaels. I decided to find out something about St Giles, who has come up over the tea break when we scythers are out with Caring for God's Acre (our conversations range far and wide!).

St Giles starts off the month as his feast day is on the first, so a neat and tidy way to start (see first line above!). He has been very popular since the seventh century, which is when he was born, maybe in Greece. He moved to France, close to the

village of Saint-Gilles, where he lived as a hermit. Each day he was visited by a deer hind who fed him her milk. But one day

the king was out hunting and the clever hind hurried to the hermitage for protection. The king fired his arrow and instead of hitting the deer, it hit Giles instead, and he was crippled for life. He died at the beginning of the eighth century but that did not stop his popularity. A monastery was built on the spot of his tragic accident, and over time he became the patron saint of disabled people, beggars and lepers.

Leprosy was common in the Middles Ages, a time when churches started being built of stone. The general population was not keen on lepers sharing their space, so churches were built on the edges of towns and villages where lepers could attend services separately. They were dedicated to St Giles. In some churches you will find the 'squint' an angled opening in the wall near the altar where lepers could see the service from outside the building. Barrow church was a chapel of Much Wenlock Abbey and Ludford a chapel of Bromfield priory. In Shrewsbury, St Giles on Wenlock road was recorded as a church in 1136, and by 1155 there was a leper hospital on the site. Nothing of the hospital survives today, but St Giles church survives as a parish church in the town. Chetton and Badger churches are also dedicated to St Giles.



DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 23RD JULY 2025 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

Present: Clirs D Hedgley, T O'Boyle, R Povall, A Watson, A Rattu, R Morgan, A Watts, S Povall and C Martyn.

Apologies: Cllr Colin Stanford, Corvedale Division Shropshire Councillor.

In attendance: The Clerk.

Approval of Minutes: The Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting on 25th June 2025 were approved and two matters arising were dealt with.

Reports: The Chairman reported on his discussion with Mrs Annie Brick. He had raised further issues concerning the planning difficulties at Green Farm. He had completed and submitted SC's Youth Questionnaire and on Friday he would be representing DPC at the Better Communications symposium being held by Shropshire Council, at which he would ask for a dedicated member of the highways team to act as a first point of contact for DPC. He had dealt with issues concerning notices on the DPC bus shelters. He had completed a crime survey and pointed out that we get no feedback or visits from the Police. Cllr R Povall said local farmers get all their information about crime in the area from the NFU.

Corvedale Cllr Stanford did not attend the meeting but sent a written report with information about major infrastructure projects to highways north of Shrewsbury. SC had acquired two new resurfacing machines which hopefully would resurface and repair potholes with a pressurised mix that sealed repairs. The Shropshire Local Plan had been rejected by the Inspectorate in February: SC was hoping to offer training and guidance to parish councils on how to be an effective part of the call to landowners and developers to put forward proposals for site developments. He had been appointed as a member of the Shropshire Hills National Landscape Group and would attend his first meeting on 30th July.

Flood Action Group Report: Cllr Martyn had attended a Flood Forum meeting on 3rd July at which the problems in Bouldon had been discussed: work would start in August. The wall at Peaton had been repaired satisfactorily. He had discussed the concerns raised by a resident about the development at 3-4 Mill Lane, Diddlebury. He hoped Jack Wrigley would take his gamekeeper with him when he went to inspect the leaky dams with Sarah Markness of Shropshire Wildlife Trust as the gamekeeper had much local knowledge about where leaky dams are most effective: a fact which was confirmed by Cllr Watts.

Diddlebury Village Hall Report: Cllr Rattu had attended a DVH meeting on 7th July. It had been suggested that a big sign be painted on the end wall identifying the hall more easily from the road. There had been much discussion about notice boards: the

hall was planning to erect its own notice board and advised that information on the Three Castles map was out of date.

Highways And Environmental Matters: The Chairman, Andy Keyland of highways and local residents had met to discuss the impact that the proposed road closure scheme in Bouldon would have on residents and businesses. Cllr Watson said Severn Trent's works had been completed but they were planning to install a new water tank at the Moors site. Cllr O'Boyle was concerned for the safety of children playing in Mill Lane during the holidays. The Chairman felt DPC had done all it could in safety terms by erecting the recent warning signs and creating the new playground. Cllr Rattu asked if anything further had been heard about the united approach to highways and about the speed on the B4368. Nothing further had been heard and there had been no police presence. The Clerk had raised a damaged bridge over a culvert in Westhope with highways and would seek a progress report.

Communications and Correspondence: Nine items were considered and noted.

Finance Report for July 2025: Cheques totalling £753.18 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds of £19,999.33 including ring fenced and third-party funds. The cash book/bank statements reconciliation were approved by Cllr O'Boyle.

The provision of a notice board in Bache Mill was discussed. Having discussed this with some residents, Cllr Martyn had not as yet established a satisfactory site for a board, so the matter would be deferred to the next meeting. The board at Sutton may just need work on the legs: Cllr Watts would ask Mr T Pardoe to have a look at it.

Any Other Business: The IT problems experienced by the Clerk during July were discussed at length. A new domain name for DPC namely *clerk@diddlebury-pc.gov.uk* had now been launched but was being used concurrently with the outlook.com email address to prevent emails being lost.

As there was no further business to conduct, the meeting was closed at 9.10pm.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 24th September commencing at 7.30pm at Westhope Village Hall. There would be no meeting in August unless urgent matters arose.

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
